Dear Mother

We are very sorry to hear that you have been sick with the grippe. I hope you are entirely well now.

We have been having some exceedingly cold weather. It has been down to fifty below several mornings & forty several more. There was quite a lot of wind too with some of the thirty below weather which makes it a great deal colder than fifty without wind. I had to be invisible doing my picture anyway so that the cold weather did not bother much except at night.

Did I tell you about our making ice cream? It is one of our favorite dishes now. To make about a quart I use a half can of milk (2 cans for 25¢) about four tablespoonfuls of sugar & a teaspoonful of vanilla & beat with an eggbeater for a

minute or so, then gradually put in some cold clean snow & beat it in until hard enough so that the eggbeater doesn't turn easy. It makes fine ice cream & is a great luxury and not at all expensive.

You asked if we put in our seed in the fall. We do not. We do all our seeding in the spring. This does not seem to be a fall wheat district. Everyone here raises spring wheat.

The regular passenger train is supposed to start tomorrow & run thru to Calgary. Heretofore it has gone only as far as Hanna, the divisional point.

The weather is stormy today but not very cold about five below. It is snowing & blowing but I have to go to town to get some mounts which I have been waiting for and to mail some letters.

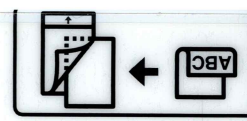

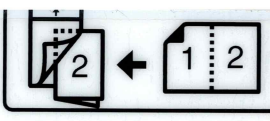
