Dear Mr. Belden:

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the receipt of your inquiry, which arrived this morning; and under separate cover I will send full particulars, as you request, concerning the advertisement in which you have become interested.

You are in a good field for newspaper correspondence, Mr. Belden, and I believe you will like the work, as it involves no canvassing - no waiting on customers - no drudgery.

By close application, you should earn anywhere from \$25 to \$100 a week, the amount depending naturally on the quantity and quality of your contributions; and even if you can give only spare time to this vocation it should enable you to add from \$15 to \$25 a week to your present income.


By duplicating or syndicating news and feature stories to many newspapers, a newspaper correspondent may earn all the way up to \$200 a week, and I have earned even more. The plan I followed is explained in a very interesting booklet I am sending to you in this evening's mail.
