I enclose check for ^{\$}50#
to your order which you can endorse
and send to your landlady in
Rechesten, and also enclose an
envelope addressed to her which
I presume you put in my letter
by mistake. I have also sent
you by express (American) ^{\$}252#
in bills making up the total
of your drawings on Savings Bk
of ^{\$}302# I sent the money by
express in preference to sending checks
as from your letter I gathered that
Rechesten people do not like checks.
Since sending the money I have
reread your letter and notice
that you wished a second check

of \$55[#] to send away and am
sorry that I did not so arrange it
but it is too late now.

I have drawn the money from the
Greenwich Bank and from the
Seamens Bank but have not
yet had time to draw the \$100[#]
from the Bleeker Street Bank
but expect to do so tomorrow
night when they are open in
the evening.

I find that I did not figure
the interest close enough and that
you are a trifle richer than you
thought as you have a balance
of just about 5. in the Greenwich
Bk and of $3 \frac{94}{100}$ in the Seamens
Bk and Ellen's balance is
 $335 \frac{97}{100}$ in the Seamens while
the amt left in the Bleeker
St is still an unknown quantity
as the interest is not yet written
up but it will not vary much from
12 as stated by you

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In regard to the balance of 3⁹⁴
in the Seamen's Bank I am told
that you must either draw the
amount or else deposit enough
to make up your balance to
\$5# as the bank will not
allow any account with a
balance below \$5#
