My dearest Mrs. Baldwin - and
Dear big girls - and little girls -
big boys and little boys -

I think I owe you all
letters, so will write to the
entire dear family, about
whom I seem to know so
little just now, for it seems
very long since I have
heard about you - And I
hope the beautiful spring
weather is finding you all
well and strong - I see

I don't think it pays to write so many letters to people I don't know, for I can't bear my friends out very often.

The 20th of January we had an evangelist here, Mr Jackson & all the churches united in union services twice a day for three weeks, with many morning neighborhood prayer-meetings. Someone said it was the realization of Mr Pilgrim's hopes, when he said - What a changed place Bristol would be, if people only talked about their religion on the streets. That was just what they did - and the result has been a great gathering into the churches. On the first Sunday in March thirty-nine united with our church.

Hilda has probably written you as she and Alice Maid and Hazel Peck were among them, and more are coming in May - when I expect to bring my letter from Blyton -

I stayed over for the Inauguration
time - and saw McKinley
take the oath of office and
the great parade and
all the sights.
