

Dear Ellen:

I have been thinking about you so much since receiving your letter saying Nell has the gripe, and hoping that all will come out well.

Miss Fairchild told me when she was here that she thought all the classes were going to have costumes for commencement. I remember the year I got my Ph. D., which was a very big reunion year at Yale, a lot of classes there did that. Some wore them all the time. No women did, of course, & not classes of graduate students. It bores me beyond words to make a fool of myself, but perhaps people would think less badly of us than if we were not good sports enough to go in on what others are doing. I'm not sure but I agree with you about not bothering on the designing.

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I wonder if I ought to write to Mary Cochran that you can't undertake it, or if we shall just let it go till she writes to you? I don't think she would do that.

Yes, I think the "book talk" ideas are great. I wrote a couple of days ago to Helen Bennett of the Chicago Bureau of Occupations asking her if there was any way to go at getting these jobs & if she got them.

I forgot what else Mary spoke of besides the Parliamentary Law. I nearly did that here last fall, you know. Somehow it fell through. I am not awfully interested in it.

I wrote to Mary in reply to that letter and asked her how she'd advise getting engagements for book-talks. I wish I could get some in Ohio for the times of the year I should be there so as to begin working this up right away.
