girls to church this evening Sunday.

My dear Father at Home:-

Here I am dressed
and waiting for the bell to ring
for us to go down stairs and
start for church. Can you
imagine it? It is lovely
& warm & I have on my
organandy which I wore Friday
evening to dinner and had
pleasure communicating from
the theater.

Last evening we had faculty
meeting. There and the other
places that I have seen her
I admire & like Miss Devore.
She is personally very un-
attractive to me, her manner-
isms I dislike, but she is
cordial kindly and com-
fortable - have a positive

wonder as you as I have seen
her yet. I hope that I can
satisfy her entirely and I
don't believe she will be
in any way unreasonable.

The other evening Miss
Davis began talking to me
about the Christian life &
the school. She began by say-
ing that she didn't know as
I was interested and I assured
her I was in some way
I feel more comfortable
with her since that. She
know of course I feel as
if I must do some thing
that way and I'm so glad
the minister is of the same
mind. Miss Davis said
that Miss Devore felt
quite badly because last
year there wasn't a Christian
atmosphere in the school

and one reason she thought there was not was because some of the teachers never went to ~~school~~ church and didn't have a good influence. I don't know how Miss Stark is, but I imagine she's not extra religious.

Will finish later.

After church. I'm waiting for the luncheon bell to ring. Suppose I'll have time to think about the future.

I certainly have not been over working since I have been here. Yesterday, as soon as I finished my room work I took some girls down to "the village" to shop. It places great dignity in the place to call it the village for the florists are hardly florists. They aren't bigger than ~~or~~ first stores the

other's outside the Company Store.
Then when we returned in
four days I took a nap and
I guess I slept nearly three
hours. In the afternoon I
took a drive into the country
with three of the teachers and
after dinner we had Faculty
meeting. Between times I
studied a little. I wrote &
letter or so. I haven't had
so little to do any week
this summer as I have
since I've been here, but I've
been very tired. May be it's
the reading. Since I have
I fear that you must be
awfully tired.

Miss Steele has answers
in her arithmetic and
haven't in my algebra. I'm
going to write to the publishers
to ask if there are any. Miss
Steele works for the answers

when she can't get a problem. She
was in here several times
yesterday to get my help.
A true helper she was,
hasn't she? My algebra
hasn't troubled me yet. One
of the girls in algebra II is
very bright, I guess.

Bye -

My work has been changed
again and now I have the rhetoric
class myself and Miss Steele
has my United States history
class and I have the psychology
but not the others. The school
comes only 2 or 3 times a week
so that the work is even less.
Every thing else comes once
a day. I feel awfully badly
for her. Miss Davis thinks I
made a mess but I think
I was really nice about
the work, only at first of

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course, I told her how I felt about teaching math. & I tell her I presume advanced classes and older pupils - that I thought it would be better to have her first management about the young classes as we have now. I have not said anything about it for sometime now. I like the work fairly well now, and I don't think it will be at all arduous. I am very interested in being in a school of this kind.

Do you want to know what we had for dinner? I guess they have dinner at noon on Sunday, at about one o'clock. They had soup as always, boiled chicken, mashed potato, dum-

tomatoes, ice-cream and
copper. The eating here is
pretty fair, I think - not
as good as we have at
home. In the morning we
always have fruit, I
cut peaches usually, today
cut bananas (?) There is
always good cream and
seems to be plenty of it.
Then we have oat-meal,
then some thing else of the
fried kind, I think, I
can't remember, we only
have meat once a day.
For dinner we have
rice, squash & cream po-
tatoes probably, tomatoes,
potatoes probably, sauer
kraut or sauer
kraut and they do not take
off the plates.

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Do you know I forgot to
bring my laundry bag?
I'll have to fix a' tolle
for one this week. I also
did not bring a wash-
cloth, but has a little
towel to use. There is none
in the room. There is no
towel on the wash stand.
~~There is one to use, but I meant as cover.~~
~~One & may~~ just as if
I had made a bag in-
person or the teachers. I
ought not to think about
whether people like me &
not, I know.

The girls can only go to the
stores once a week when with
a teacher and then they can
only buy ten cents worth of
candy. They can have fruit.
There was a man in

church this morning who
spoke in Worcester College. He
spoke only a few minutes
after the dinner. Did you
know that the missionaries
children at the home here
are off to the college? The
man that spoke must be
Irish or Scotch, I think by his
accent.

The girls are laughing, come
of them, and the rest are telling
them to be quiet or they'll get
the teacher after them. They have
quiet hours on Sunday after
noon but Miss Dr. Fox says
that she usually lets them
do about as they wish the
first week.

There is one teacher whom I
have not met yet, Miss
Logan. She came a little
late and is new. She is not

at all attractive looking. is more
common looking than most
gibens, but Miss Steele says
she's nice. Franklin is not
at all pretty or stylish or
anything like that but nice.
I met her yesterday. She is
a woman and speaks with a
strong accent. She has gray
hair, very straight, combed
back straight - slightly a little.
One of the girls told me today
that she was the most un-
grateful woman she had
ever known. & I am always
meaning unfortunate re-
marks that show me to be
different from what I am. This
afternoon some of us teachers
were looking at the long
piazza which is also my
home which is accessible

only from the "girls' rooms and
they were saying that a teacher
ought to have me off those
rooms. Miss Bowman said
that come on the south or
the north side and sit in
the benches set in front of
the grass in the yard or
campus and smoke. She
suggested in me that I ought
to drop down a story and
said when the girls would
tell her me, to which Miss
Bowman replied that we
must all be willing to be
told or some thing to that
effect. She was frank in
her way, but she was
always fond of making rather
unfortunate remarks like
that.

I have been too lazy to come-

ting to get glasses and pass
out the pictures. I have
and by the way I havent the
standing up the picture of
Eveline. Well get it Xmas
time.

A number of the daughters
of Mr. Foster, the Ivory soap,
Foster & Hubbard man, live
here & I think he does him-
self. One is the daughter of
wife of the Episcopal clergy-
man & her father built her
a beautiful & grand stone
house next to the church. There
is another wealthy family
here and here two families
have intermarried a good
deal. The town is very exclusive
I guess no one has much
to do with the colored people.
no tell you the lady the

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wife of Dr. Potter, who had it
after her husband's death &
before Miss De Wolfe, alienated
all the town people. I have
not seen or met a soul
out side of the village and
we seem to be a community
by ourselves here. I imagine
it will get very tame indeed.
Of course the girls have
walks etc but I should
think they would like
a little game there from
the out side occasionally.
They say though that the
girls do get acquainted in
some way with the boys in
town. I can't tell how any
one would come to a private
school unless it was ~~very~~
~~very~~ ~~private~~ in preference to

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a place like Oshkosh. I don't believe they have nearly as much fun and certainly not as good teaching. Don't teach such lessons abroad. I want to do all I can for this school, you know, now that I am a part of it & I think it is my duty to. I hope I haven't made any fatal errors yet & good school too.

states but not necessarily
far from here. One little
girl (my grammar class!) told
me she lived in some place
in Kentucky and came to
find out it's only seven miles
from Cincinnati. Some of
them live in Cincinnati
there are about a half a
dozen to come and here the
schools will be smaller than
last year.

It is just lovely out of my
window. Mamma you would
appreciate the peace around
here as I was riding yester-
day I wished you were here
with me or instead of me. I
do wonder how you are feeling.
I have only had one letter
~~from home~~ and then you

were all very tired, Gertrude said.
I know you havent a bit of
time now to write till after
college hours but I hope you
won't over work.

Good bye, every body. I
wish every thing good to
you all. I wish you were
all having as happy a time
as I am. I feel awful.
