so much a nuisance & no envelopes.

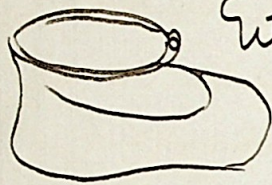
I made 3 doz sandwiches for Mrs. Griswold Thursday & soon will have
