We are having extreme steady cold, so much snow, blocked roads so but so far have been in as comfortable health as usual no severe colds ourselves.

I remember reciting your piece in the Evangelist in India, but of course did not know who by.

The last I knew of Miss. Hunt she was teaching in Boston, but that was some

time ago.

"We have enjoyed your sermons, but yet would enjoy hearing them delivered by the author so much better.

Wonder if we will ever have church privileges that will seem like home again. I think we have a real good man here, but he cannot preach, tries so hard, it is painful some times to look at him, but I never stay at home when I can go. He finds so much infidelity to contend with, held meetings three or four <sup>or</sup> weeks in January, but met with no success.
