Trudie dearest - Not time enough to reply to your SD which arrived early this morning. I am sorry that you were so used up after your trip to W.P., but not surprised, for it was pretty strenuous. Any way, I had a nice time with you! Wasn't it a fine little visit!

Today is beautiful - not a cloud in the sky & temperature a little above freezing. A only hope that it will continue like this for tomorrow when we drive back; don't want to have another experience like last Saturday! More than ever, I feel that a good train is good enough for me!

Uncle Joe and Lindsay went out to the Crocker Farm this morning & are not home yet. I don't know what we will do this afternoon. Joe isn't too strong - is taking a lot of digitalis; that's one reason that I don't want to drive over slippery roads in a storm!

Here is a calamity which May has just

told me of: - the morning that Humphrey got back to College, he returned from breakfast, to find on opening his closet that his fine new-suit case, and the gold watch which L & M gave him for his 21st birth-day, had been stolen - impossible to get any trace of them; probably a sneak-thief while students were on vacation. Now, my dear I haven't said anything to Mary, but if possible I want to replace the suit-case. When you have time, will you please look at S & C's (or any where else) and see if you can find any thing like the one you selected, ^{at what price} and let me know - perhaps next Monday when I expect to see you? Isn't it just a shame!

I hear for Lindsay Clowen stairs & I suppose I will be called to luncheon in a few minutes; so I'll stop.
