Ellen. We were really glad when the
Elmira family arrived. Ellen belongs to
a club of Merken & further members
who have been simply wonderful. The sub

came over & did all manner of things that
they don't do even in their own fine homes.
It was a great help and Ellen accepted
it most gracefully.

Ellen has not the crying sort of sorrow
and goes ahead as efficiently as ever.
