and get our train. When we went
to 12th St for our things I found Jennie
had made up her mind we were
to stay to supper and then all
night, much to my surprise

us and I thought it would make

morning. We expected to leave at
9:40 but were told that train
did not stop at Trouton and
so we had to take the 10:00 train
