I have received your Circular &c. and  
read them with interest. They manifest no small amount of  
careful study, and of adaptation to the end in view.

As to the special point of my being available for some of the services—well,  
in general, I am under Doctor's orders not to go out in the evening if it can be helped—of course  
sometimes it cannot be. But chiefly, the two Synods in the Atlantic South have been engaged to  
be by my colleagues, in connection with two other Synods, for visits at their meetings—in the in-  
terest of our Board. If I should go to the Atlantic and Catawba Synods, I could not well be at your  
meetings. (I often wonder if we could not utilize the colored membership and ministry of our church better for  
our work in Africa.) It is not my way to ask to be excused—but in this instance you will not count  
on me.
