Synopsis of Proposed Proceedings.

Devotional Meetings.

The hour from 9 to 10 o'clock in the forenoon of each day will be for Prayer and Conference. Special subjects may be proposed for the consideration of the meeting, and special subjects of prayer named. Some of those already mentioned are: "The Necessity of Banding in Prayer for Oneness in Christ, that denominational differences may cease to be a hindrance to acceptance and growth of the Truth." "The Gift of the Spirit and the Interposition of Divine Guidance and Guardianship in Mission Fields Abroad, and Not Less in Our Own Land." Prayer that Pastors in America may be led to preach more on foreign missions: That God would raise up more thoroughly qualified medical missionaries: For missionary children. Other themes and subjects for prayer will be presented. It is specially desired that these devotional meetings may be greatly blessed to the upbuilding of the whole missionary force present. Prayer groups of twos, threes, or more will be helpful as preparatory to the general meetings. It is suggested that groups of missionaries from the same field might meet for even fifteen minutes of prayer, from time to time.

General Proceedings.

The initial meeting will occur on Wednesday evening at the Tabernacle. There will be an address of welcome, and response, and the Recognition service, in answer to Roll-call, that the missionaries present may state their fields, years of service, and class of work; for the purpose of introducing the members to each other, at the very commencement of the week's interview.

On Thursday evening, REV. JOHN HENRY BARROWS, D. D., of Chicago, Chairman of the General Committee on Religious Congresses at the World's Fair, will deliver an address on "The Parliament of Religion," of the World's Congress Auxiliary to the World's Columbian Exposition. It will be of great interest to the members, to be thus made acquainted at first hand, with the scheme of the National Government, concerning matters which include their work, historically and prospectively, at the World's Fair.

On Friday night, REV. DR. CYRUS HAMLIN will lecture on "Bulgaria and the Bulgarians." No more competent authority nor live subject could be presented; and, though past four-score years of age, there is no man more alive to the great public interests and issues of the day.

REV. A. P. HAPPER, M. D., D. D., will lecture, at an hour to be determined upon, on "Forty-seven Years in China." REV. J. L. NEVIUS, D. D., will deliver a lecture on "The Phenomena of Demoniacal Possession in

the Present Age." Dr. Nevius has had thirty-nine years of service on the China field.

A special Ladies' Meeting to be addressed exclusively by ladies will be held on Friday afternoon. All the evening meetings will be of a popular character, and most of the afternoon meetings as well.

The President's Reception will be held on Saturday afternoon at four o'clock, in the Sanitarium parlors, for the purpose of presenting the missionaries to DR. and MRS. FOSTER, DR. and MRS. THAYER, and other officers of the Sanitarium; and to other hosts and hostesses and friends who may be present. All are welcome.

Saturday night, it is intended to have a Stereopticon Exhibition with several lecturers to explain the views.

Sunday there will be a Consecration Meeting at 9 a. m.; sermon by REV. S. H. KELLOGG, D. D., of Toronto, Canada, at 10:30. Mass meeting for Children at 2 p. m.; and one at 4 o'clock for Christian Endeavor, Epworth League and Y. M. C. A. workers; addresses by many speakers, with curios to illustrate.

Monday afternoon will be largely given up to a consideration of the Relation of the Returned Missionary to the development of the missionary spirit in the Home church. This will be conducted by REV. JAMES MUDGE, D. D. Monday evening will be a Symposium on Medical Missionary Work, conducted by DR. C. C. THAYER, in charge of the Sanitarium. A large number of medical missionaries will take part.
