PROGRAM:—The theme of the meeting will be "Cases from Contacts of Christianity with other Faiths."

Wednesday evening will be devoted to the roll call of those present and the Review of World Wide Missionary Progress.

At 9 o'clock each morning there will be a devotional period.

From 9:30 to 11:30 A. M. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the following questions will be considered in open forums:

I. The right attitude of missionaries toward non-Christian religions.

1. Their places of worship.
2. Their Scriptures and the extent to which these may be wisely used.
3. Their religious rituals and symbols.
4. Their sages and religious leaders.
5. Their religious conceptions and practices.

II. What principles and practices should control a missionary in reforming the social life.

1. In marriage.
2. In directing and developing parental authority.
3. In social customs—e.g., bride price, bride rearing, polygamy and mixed marriages.
4. In adjusting the missionary home to influence the home life of the people most powerfully, e.g., size and style of building, furnishing, order and arrangement, hospitality and entertainment, standards and ideals.

III. The right relation of the missionary to industrial and economic conditions on his field.

1. In the scale of remuneration for the mission assistants.
2. In accepting contributions for mission work from non-Christians.
3. In aiding business owned by Christians.
4. In helping churches.
5. In developing self-support.
6. In elevating the scale of the people's living.

The evening sessions will be given up to platform meetings in which the inspiring advance from all the frontiers will be presented by the best speakers present.

Saturday evening there will be a moving picture presentation, "The Eternally Accursed."

Sunday morning there will be the annual address and Sunday evening a farewell to the outgoing forces.

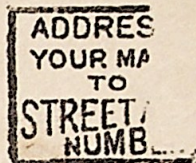
The afternoons will be devoted to recreation and good fellowship. Golf and tennis players will be satisfied with the fine courts and links of the Sanitarium.
